Orchard Developments

You may have noticed developments in our school orchard. Willie Davies and his team have kindly constructed a new fence to define the space. Our enviro team is now focused on preparing the soil for planting. James Marsh has built collection bins by the orchard for community donations of organic material, including:

- Cardboard, newspaper
- Compost, worm castings
- Leaf mulch, grass clippings, straw or hay, comfrey, seaweed
- Pea straw, wood chips, shredded paper or cardboard
- Coffee grounds, eggshells, wood ash (untreated)

Please ensure all materials are bagged and tightly secured. We also welcome donations of vegetable plants, fruit trees, grape vines, berry canes, native trees and shrubs, or bee-friendly

ANZAC with Kahū

On March 12 Ernie Gartrell from the RSA came to talk to Kahu (Year 7 & 8) about the Gallipoli campaign. This was the ignition for our inquiry about ANZAC Day, and inspired us to do more research, and find out more about the soldiers who fought bravely in WWI.

We were compelled by Ernie's incredible talk, and the fascinating information that we learnt from him. He told us about how the war started (the assassination of Archduke Franz Ferdinand), how the war ended, and what happened throughout it. We learnt about the soldiers who fought, the techniques they used, and how the death toll affected New Zealand, setting off a domino effect all through Aotearoa. We were surprised to learn that most of the soldiers that were not killed in war brought the Spanish Flu back to NZ, and suffered from the illness before eventually passing away. He shared with us the compelling and tragic story of Gallipoli, and we now know about the history behind the red

We are all very grateful to Ernie for taking time out of his day to teach us about the Gallipoli campaign, and we all learnt something fascinating about the history of Aotearoa and what was one of the defining factors of our nation. It was amazing to have an insight into what it would have been like to be the soldiers, and that gave us a new understanding of the war that we will hold onto for the rest of our lives. 




EASTBOURNE COMMUNITY FITNESS - PILATES CLASS
